

School News Board looks at options for possible facility renovations

ATLANTIC – The Atlantic School Board discussed options for possible renovations for facilities - both instructional and athletic during its meeting this week.

According to other reports, Jerry Purdy, Design Alliance architect, said there are three options for instructional needs: leave everything as it is currently, put additions on all the buildings, or build a new middle school next to the high school. Estimated cost for additions on all the buildings is \$9.5 million, and estimated cost for a new middle school is \$19 million.

Representatives from Snyder and Associates discussed the athletic facility needs. One topic was the Trojan Bowl, and whether to renovate it (estimated cost \$5.5 million) or move it to the high school, and make that area a multiple-purpose facility (for football, soccer and track). The estimated cost was would \$2.5 million.

There was also discussion about the baseball and softball complex, and how moving it to a different area could be one option. There was also discussion about building an additional competition gym at the high school, including additional locker room space and a training area, and upgrading the bleachers at the middle school.

The next step is for board members to make a plan for the possible renovations, and figure out a way to pay for them.

Steps to fill Audubon County Attorney vacancy

The Audubon County Board of Supervisors met in special session on Thursday, Oct. 27 to determine what their next steps will be in filling the vacancy in the County Attorney's Office.


The board declared the vacancy effective Oct. 25, after determining elected County Attorney Francine O'Brien Andersen was not qualified to perform the statutory duties of the office. Cass County Attorney David Weiderstein was then appointed to serve as acting County Attorney.

So what comes next for Audubon County?

As they have already named an acting County Attorney, step one is complete, however, according to Patrick Smith, the board's legal counsel, Wiederstein's appointment only covers the next 90 days, but, that time frame could be extended.

"Per code requirements, first, you must appoint an acting County Attorney. Then the board has 40 days to appoint a county attorney to fill the rest of Francine's term," Smith stated. "If after 40 days, no eligible county resident is

Playwright in New York writes novel about life in Iowa

Today, Stuart M. Harris lives in Brooklyn, N. Y., a far cry from southwest Iowa, but the author and playwright has ties to Iowa - he spent summers in Audubon, where his mother grew up - and he has just completed a book, "The Northeast Quarter," following generations of Iowans, and a young girl growing up in a small town.

Stuart's family did more than visit Audubon - he's the great-great-grandson of Captain Charles Stuart, the founder of Audubon, and his family has had property there since the Civil War.

Of about 20 farms that the family once owned, one remains, and still belongs to Stuart, all because of a promise that he made to his mother.

His mother told him, "Don't ever sell Section 10, keep it for yourself and your

family," he said, and "I kept the property, and that provided the springboard for my novel."

Stuart was born in California, and grew up in Los Angeles, but later moved to New York, to pursue his career writing plays.

He's had several plays produced Off Broadway and at almost 70 years of age, Stuart set out to write his first novel. The story actually began as a full length play, but he thought it would work better as a novel. Re-


